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# About our Contributions, Fees & Charges

The WA College of Agriculture – Denmark Finance Committee reviewed and approved the contributions, charges and fees outlined in this booklet on 25 October 2023 with the College Board providing their endorsement on 03 December 2023.

This document outlines the **maximum** costs that the College can apply to student accounts, which may comprise the following elements:

## Contributions

A Contribution is a voluntary payment requested from parents / carers towards the cost of materials, services and facilities used Year 10 students in the educational program.

## Charges

Any costs for which payment is compulsory. As such, students may be moved from high-cost options to lower cost options in the event of non-payment <sup>1</sup>.

## Extra Cost Optional Components

Voluntary courses and activities where the parent or student elects to participate. A student's participation in an extra cost optional component is voluntary, however, participation is conditional on payment of costs for the component.

## Personal Items

Costs that are met by parents and cares for other services provided by the College for convenience but are not required for educational program.

## Voluntary Approved Requests

Voluntary payments that contribute to the enrichment of the learning program for all students at the College.

## Fees

Applicable only to Residential Accommodation provided by the College for which payment is compulsory.

## Refunds

Refunds or transfer of credits will be made for all voluntary contributions, compulsory course charges and for other services provided by the College if unused. Refunds will be calculated and made in accordance with the Department of Education *Refunds Calculation Table for Secondary Schools*.

Payments, including deposits for camps, excursions and incursions will not be refundable where there has been a cost to the College.

No refund of contributions, fees or charges will be made for any short-term periods of absence.

These guidelines may be reviewed in extenuating circumstances when an application is made in writing to the College.

## Non-payment

Students may be moved from high-cost options to lower cost options in the event of the non-payment of fees and charges. This also includes the possible restriction of meals provided by the College as well as residential accommodation.

# Equine Program

## Equine Program Fee Structure and Important Information

This information should be read in conjunction with the WA College of Agriculture – Denmark Horse Guidelines. The following fee schedule indicated the **maximum** costs applicable.

### Horse Agistment

Having a horse agisted at the College allows your child access to their own horse during the equine program, after school and during the residential program. Your horse will be provided with a safe, shared paddock with secure facilities to store equine related equipment and feed. Privately owned horses are the sole responsibility of the owner and as such you are responsible for all health, veterinary, farriery and dental treatments. Standard hay requirements are included in the horse agistment charge.

### Use of College Horse

The College will provide access to a College owned horse during the school program. No one horse is allocated to a student and access is at the discretion of the Equine Supervisor. Students will not have access to College owned horses after hours without the prior permission of the Equine Supervisor.

### Horse Feed / Biosecurity

No hay is to be brought onto the College Farm in order to comply with farm Biosecurity. Quality hay is provided by the College of which is inclusive of the Horse Agistment charge. Additional feed may be purchased by the College if required [e.g., oaten hay] of which a charge per bale will apply. All other horse feed requirements are

to be purchased prior to the horse coming onto the College site.

### Equestrian Helmets - Mandatory

Students participating in the Equine program either during school or residential time are required to provide their own equestrian helmet. An approved equestrian helmet is one that meets Australian Standard AS/NZS 3838-2006 or equivalent, is within date and is specifically designed for equestrian use.

### Uniform Requirements

All students must be appropriately dressed as per information provided in the *Uniforms & Booklists Handbook*.

### Personal Accident Insurance

The Department of Education does not provide personal accident insurance for students while they are at school or in residence. Parents and carers may obtain personal accident insurance for their child from a private insurer of their choice. The Department or schools do not broker personal accident insurance for students or any other person. Further, there is no cover for ambulance fees whether or not the school has called an ambulance. The exception to this rule is if a student is on authorised work experience or a camp or excursion involving an overnight stay.

# Residential Students Only

## Fees, Charges, Extra Cost Options and Voluntary Approved Requests

The College will provide accommodation, laundry and cleaning services and all meals to all residential students.

The Department of Education sets and charges the annual residential accommodation fees listed in the table below.

For convenience to parents / carers, residential accommodation fees are divided into three terms and are payable on day on of terms one, two and three unless prior arrangements have been made with the Manager Corporate Services.

First and second instalments must be cleared by the end of Semester 1 for students to continue in residence in Semester 2. The third instalment must be cleared prior to the commencement of Term 4.

Residency will be denied at the commencement of the following year if the previous year's residential fees have not been paid in full. In these circumstances, these students can continue their education program as day students.

# Financial Assistance

## Boarding Away from Home Allowance Agricultural Special Subsidy

The Western Australian Department of Education makes available a student Boarding Away from Home Allowance (BAHA) each year to families with children attending primary and/or secondary school.

In 2024, this allowance will be \$1,320 if the student is in residential accommodation for the entire year. Pro-rata payments are also made.

This subsidy is not available to:

- Parents / carers who are in receipt of Assistance for Isolated Children
- Students who are in receipt of Youth Allowance at the Away Rate or
- Students who are in receipt of ABSTUDY with full boarding paid by Centrelink.

Deductions will be made to the student account once the College receives the completed form.

An application form will be provided to parents / carers in March with a closing date of 31 July.

## Boarding Away from Home Allowance Assistance for Isolated Children

In 2024 this allowance will be \$1,320 if the student is in residential accommodation for the entire year subject to confirmation that you have received the Assistance for Isolated Children (AIC) allowance or Second Home Allowance for the whole of the year. Pro rata payments are also made for periods over one month in duration.

A deduction is made to the student account once the College receives the completed form along with evidence of receiving AIC.

An application form will be provided to parents / carers in March with a closing date of 30 November.

## Personal Payment Plan

A personalised instalment plan is an available option to help you pay College subject and residential boarding fees in regular affordable instalments.

We average your charges (excluding extra-curricular charges) over the school year so you can pay in set instalments via direct debit. You can choose whether to pay weekly, fortnightly, or monthly.

We will review your personalised instalment plan regularly and advise you if you are on target or if any adjustments may be required. There are no additional fees or costs involved in a personalised instalment plan.

## Secondary Assistance Scheme

The Department of Education provides an allowance to assist eligible families with secondary schooling costs. To be eligible for the allowance the parent / carer must hold a Centrelink Family Health Care Card, Centrelink Pensioner Concession Card or a Veterans' Affairs Pensioner Concession Card that represents a statement of low

income for the family. The allowance consists of two components:

- \$115 Clothing Allowance which will be paid to the parent / carer unless indicated on the application form that you wish it to be paid to the College.
- \$235 Education Program Allowance which is paid directly to the College and will be deducted from contributions and charges.

Late applications will only be accepted in extenuating circumstances with a written explanation.

An application form will be issued with your first statement in March. The application form will need to be completed and returned to the College prior to the closing date, typically the last day of Term 2.

### ABSTUDY Supplement Allowance

The Department of Education provides an allowance to assist eligible families with secondary schooling costs. The ABSTUDY Supplement Allowance is available to valid Services Australia (Centrelink) card holders,

this funding supplements the Services Australia (Centrelink) ABSTUDY Fees Allowance payment.

To be eligible for the supplement allowance, the parent/guardian must hold a Services Australia (Centrelink) or Veterans' Affairs card that represents a statement of income for the family. Furthermore, the school or parent must have received the School Fee Allowance of \$78 or \$156 from Services Australia (Centrelink) as part of the student's ABSTUDY School Fees Allowance.

The Department of Education ABSTUDY Supplement Allowance consists of \$79 paid directly to the school. Please note that the Secondary Assistance Scheme cannot be claimed as well as this allowance.

Late applications will only be accepted in extenuating circumstances with a written explanation.

An application form will be issued with your first statement in March. The application form will need to be completed and returned to the College prior to the closing date, typically the last day of Term 2.

### Student Subsidised Travel Scheme



The Student Subsidised Travel Scheme provides travel assistance to school and tertiary students between home and school by regular passenger transport (air, bus, or rail) via the most direct route for students who are geographically isolated.

### Assistance for Isolated Children (AIC)

You may be eligible for Assistance for Isolated Children Scheme payments if:

- you meet residence requirements.
- your family home is geographically isolated from an appropriate state school.
- the student has a disability, or a special health related or educational need that cannot be met at a local state school.

- the student does not have reasonable daily access to state schooling for at least 20 school days in a year for reasons beyond the family's control.
- the student is not geographically isolated, but they do not have reasonable daily access to state schooling; and
- the student:
  - boards away from home at a school or hostel or privately; or
  - can go to school daily because your family has a second home; or
  - lives at home and is undertaking distance education or approved home schooling.

### Saver Plus Program

Saver Plus is a matched savings and financial education program that can assist you to:

- reach a savings goal.
- become a regular saver.
- build your money management skills.

Saver Plus provides an opportunity to have every dollar saved (up to \$500) matched with an additional dollar for your own or your family's education-related expenses. Saver Plus is available in 60 locations across Australia. You may be eligible to join Saver Plus if you or your partner:

- have a Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card.
- have some regular income from work.
- are at least 18 years old; and
- are a parent or guardian of a child at school or are doing a vocational training course yourself.

### School Bus Services Conveyance Allowance

Criteria and conditions apply. School Bus Services will determine which form of transport assistance will be offered.

# A to Z Information

## Communication from the College

Statements summarising all billing items and payments received during the statement period will be sent as an electronic or hard copy to parents / carers twice per term. Many extra cost options in this document are required to be paid prior to a student participating in an activity which will be detailed in specific consent forms requiring endorsement.

If a student changes a study stream or if your account goes into credit, you will receive communication from the College regarding this. The College's preferred method of communication is via email. Please ensure that you check your email account on a regular basis to avoid missing important communications from the College.

## Booklists and Stationery Requirements

Student booklist and stationery listings can be located on the College. Full copies of the listings are also provided in the *Uniforms & Booklists Handbook*.

Files, paper and book requirements are now available to order through Champion Education with all orders completed online at [www.champion.com.au](http://www.champion.com.au) by **08/12/2023** using **PD3V** as your code.

Items are then delivered to the College for distribution to individual students at the commencement of the school year.

Please note that these items can be purchased from any supplier, not just Champion Education.

## Engineering Student Projects

All engineering student project related information within this document should be read in conjunction with the *WA College of Agriculture – Denmark Engineering Projects Policy*.

Engineering students have the option to plan, design and fabricate a major project. The cost of a minor project for Year 10 and 11 students is covered by the subject charge. Major Year 10 and Year 11 projects as well as all Year 12 student projects will require parents and carers to meet the cost of their project. Past costs of such projects have ranged from \$50 to \$6,000 relative to the scale and complexity of projects.

Students, in consultation with parents / carers and teachers, will be required to identify a personal project in the first 3 weeks of Term 1, and as part of their training, will have to prepare a costing for their approved project. A 50% deposit must be made before materials are purchased and the balance paid before the completed project leaves the College site. Projects with an unpaid balance will be required to remain at the College until payment is cleared.

## Equine – Horse Guidelines

All equestrian related information contained within this document should be read in conjunction with the *WA College of Agriculture – Denmark Horse Guidelines*.

## Excursions

The College will be conducting several residential excursions and excursions related to the academic program during the year. It is believed that the day students should be involved in some of these excursions. This involvement ensures that we continue to have good integration between the boarding and day students. The amount is payable in advance and excursion costs are deducted as they occur.

## First Aid Course

All Year 11 and new Year 12 students enrolling into College will have an opportunity to complete the Provide First Aid competency. If a student already has a current first aid certificate, a photocopy is required to put on the student file and an exemption from the course will be given.

## Individual Transportation Charges

There may be occasions where individual students may need to be taken to Albany, Albany Airport, or other areas within the Great Southern region at the request of parents / carers. Examples of this are where a parent requires a student to fly home during term time for family reasons, or a pre-arranged specialist medical appointment. In these cases, the College reserves the right to charge a fee to cover the trip and staff time transporting the student.

The costs associated with this travel are detailed in the fee schedule on page 10.

## Personal Accident Insurance

The Department of Education does not provide personal accident insurance for students while they are at school or in residence.

Parents and carers may obtain personal accident insurance for their child from a private insurer of their choice. The Department or schools do not broker

personal accident insurance for students or any other person.

Further, there is no cover for ambulance fees whether or not the school has called an ambulance. The exception to this rule is if a student is on authorised work experience or a camp or excursion involving an overnight stay.

## Q Fever Vaccinations (Q-Vax)

Q Fever is a bacterial disease that affects humans and other animals. The organism is uncommon but may be found in cattle, sheep, goats, and other domestic mammals as these animals are carriers of the disease. Humans can be exposed to the bacteria through contact with faeces, urine, milk, and blood of these animals.

Whilst vaccination is not compulsory, it is highly recommended that all new students to the College are vaccinated against Q Fever. The vaccine offers the highest level of protection against Q Fever. Students must be aged 15 or older to be vaccinated against Q Fever. Parents / Carers are required to organise vaccinations for their child directly with their nearest or preferred GP.

## Recreation Centre Entry

Students can participate in a range of activities such as dance, acrobatics, swimming, exercise classes and more at local recreation centres. Payment for such activities will be made directly to the centre by students or their parents / carers.

## Recreational Skippers Ticket

The Recreational Skippers Ticket (RST) is a qualification based on a set of State marine safety competencies for which the skipper of

a boat is required to be certified if in charge of a vessel with a motor of 6HP or more.

Delivery and assessment of this course will be through an accredited training organisation.

For students who do not hold a current Driver's License or Learner's Permit, there will be an extra charge for an eyesight / medical examination.

All costs are charged at the rate of the provider and may be payable directly to the provider, not the College. The medical examination cannot be claimed through Medicare. Discounted medical examinations may apply when combined with the scuba diving medical. Further information will be provided prior to the course being run. Payment for this activity will be made directly to the individual suppliers by students or their parents / carers.

### Scholarships

The WA College of Agriculture – Denmark invites students to participate in its Scholarship Program announced in Term 3 of each year. Several scholarships are available to Year 10, 11 and 12 students. Each scholarship has its own set of eligibility criteria. This information is available on the College website. Scholarships and awards are presented during the annual Graduation Ceremony in November of each year.

### Sports Affiliation Fees and Other Extra Curricular Activities
